MINUTES

Present: Chairman Kreg Freeman, Vice Chairman Ladon Calhoun, Commissioner Edwards, and Commissioner Niki Nixon. Others Present: Douglas Cofty, Shelia Freeman, Andy Moore, Dana Glass, Haley Reichert

Chairman Freeman calls the meeting to order. Regular session 05/09/2022 and called for a moment of silent prayer then the pledge of allegiance.

HOUSEKEEPING:

Chairman Freeman stated first thing we need to do is prove the agenda are there any additions. If not, we need a motion to approve it. Vice Chairman Calhoun made a motion to approve. Commissioner Nixon seconded the motion. Chairman Freeman stated all in favor. Commissioner Edwards stated I wasn't here. Chairman Freeman stated we're just approving the agendas. Commissioner Edwards stated Okay. Chairman Freeman stated okay. Motion carried.

Chairman Freeman asked did they review the minutes and if there needed to be any corrections. Board stated they looked ok. Chairman Freeman called for approval of the minutes. Vice Chairman Calhoun made the motion with Commissioner Nixon seconding. Chairman Freeman asked Commissioner Edwards she did not want to vote on it, Commissioner Edwards stated correct because she was not present. Chairman Freeman stated okay he was voting in favor as well, Motion carried.

FINANCIALS:

Chairman Freeman stated we have financials, and approval of accounts payable. Vice Chairman Calhoun made motion to approve with Commissioner Nixon seconding. Chairman Freeman asked Commissioner Edwards did she have any questions on that. Commissioner Edwards stated no. All in favor, Motion carried.

Chairman Freeman then stated financial reports. Commissioner Nixon made motion to approve, Vice Chairman Calhoun seconding, all in favor, motion carried.

Chairman Freeman moved to appearances and stated they had Dana Glass with Aspire

Chairman Freeman asked you want to talk to us? Ms. Glass stated I do. I will be quick. So, I brought you guys some information about our services and specific to Miller County. We used to come every mental health month to all our counties and give an update on our impact to the county and so we wanted to get back to that. Now, that things have opened. Miller County accounts for just about 2% of our service delivery. We have eight counties that we provide behavioral health, substance use, and developmental disability services too. So, we have the eight counties and then an additional seventeen that we serve through specialty contracts. We pick up Decatur and Seminole County and counties at the north end. We have outgrown our building in Miller County. We're in partnership with the Miller County Hospital and so we're in a house right there on Gray Street right across from the hospital and Haley had to do a meeting on the porch today. Ms. Glass then introduced Haley. This is Haley Reichert. She is our Western Counties coordinator. So, she coordinates all our services delivery in early in Miller and Calhoun Counties for us. She's got quite a big coverage area and I'm the executive director. So, I get to have fun with all of it. 163 individuals that we served and then you have this chart. Ms. Glass stated I'm not going to read all of it to you, but you have this chart in your packet that tells you specifically every service line that was served through Miller County. We did have several people about 36 that access our behavioral health crisis center over in Albany that is not where we want people to access the system. We really want them to get engaged in care in these outpatient level of care that are locally available in the community. So, we're hoping now that things have kind of opened back up and you know, we can get back out to people's homes, and they can come back to our clinic that we'll see things pick up more here in county-based service delivery. We are in your elementary, middle, high, and alternative schools. So, we are serving about 30 students through what we call our school-based care. So, what we do is we provide services to the student, to the parents as they engage in care, and then we also provide support for like positive behavior supports in the classrooms, and skill-based teaching for some of the teachers in in trauma-informed care and recognizing mental health disorders.

We have about 307 employees with Aspire and about 76 medical staff that we contract with. Everything from nurses, to psychiatrists, to nurse practitioners like those middle mid-level providers. Three of our staff live here in Miller County and so, you know, as an early county resident, I always like to know our financial impact and so, it's about \$122,000 that come back to your community just in those three salaries alone. We have about a 12-million-dollar payroll. You know, we would love to hire more people from Miller County. We've got openings in every in early Miller and Calhoun. So, we would love to have more people on board. About 67% of people that access care here in Miller County stay with us for four or more sessions and 34% are still engaged in care a year later. We'd like to see that increase about 38 to 40%, not because we want people to stay unwell but because we want them to stay well. Sometimes that's a little confusing but sometimes those support services are what makes the difference is that engagement and care. Historically you all have provided support to us in the amount of 5,400 annually and so we would love for that to continue. When the opioid money comes down, we would love to be considered as a treatment partner. We have crisis and detox services. We have intensive outpatient services, family, and group, and then we also have medication assisted treatment services where a prescriber provides

medications to assist with that opiate withdrawal and grieving management, but we also have certified peer specialist and licensed clinicians that work with the individual as well to really get at the root you know, while we're using opioids to begin with. So, we'd love for you to use us for some of those services here too. What we have seen is that that kind of crisis is just now starting to hit our area at the level that you know, the metro area has been seeing it for years. We've seen a sharp increase in overdoses and arrests and people trying to enter our treatment courts with those types of issues. So, all of it and then that challenge. If you have any questions or concerns or Anything you'd like to know more about? I mean how they refer to you all. We take them just about any way they come to us. The majority are self-referrals. The ones that enter through the Judicial Circuit are court ordered and mandated to treatment. They do agree but there's a mandate as part of their suspended sentence. Sometimes we get them through involuntary admissions to our crisis center. You know based on being a risk of danger to themselves or others but the bulk who we serve here are voluntary self-referrals. Chairman Freeman asked you get somebody that's homeless how you. Ms. Glass stated so, we are not a housing agency. There's a lot of confusion about that. Chairman Freeman asked How do you get somebody's got some problems and is homeless. How you get them into it? Ms. Glass stated so, Haley is our point of contact. So, we can, my card is in the front of that folder. So, you're welcome to reach out directly to me and we can connect on the person. I feel like you have somebody in mind. In particular? Chairman Freeman stated there was one. Okay. Vice Chairman Calhoun stated we have had one. Ms. Glass stated my guess is I would prefer not to, since we are on camera, prefer not to violate HIPPA at all ever, but my guess is, is that we're probably familiar with people that are homeless, and this, this area, we have some limited housing options, most of them are not located here in Miller County. There's some very specific access to those housing. Um, there's something called Shelter Plus Care and the Georgia housing voucher program. And all of those are federal mandates for how you access that. Chairman Freeman stated well, we weren't trying to find him at home. He has got some problems and I think if he might get the problem straightened out. He might get on the right track. The person has been living all over town.

Vice Chairman Calhoun stated he needs some direction. Ms. Glass stated right. Well, what we know is that housing first tends to help provide some stability for people. Chairman Freeman stated I think he has done been through all that. He's got to have some directions, so he knows how to live. Put it like that, just getting him in a house, he can't take care of it. Ms. Glass stated well I agree with you completely but if we can get somebody stably housed that helps open the pathway to provide some of those clinical services. Now we can't force adults especially. I mean we really can't force children. You know unless somebody's under a mandate. There are no repercussions about whether or not somebody decides to engage in our care. And there's very limited pathways for us as providers to take to get mandates placed on somebody. To participate in care. So, we can be ready and willing and able that whether or not they're ready and willing and able to do the work. Chairman Freeman asked the court system would probably have to put them in y'all's direction. Ms. Glass stated well it sounds like that there's been I mean it's very hard to speak because I don't know exactly who we're talking about. I have a pretty good guess. But it just depends on every situation that's individualized but a lot of times, the court system with people that have had a lot of difficulty staying on that path to recovery whether it's with a mental health issue or substance abuse. A lot of times that court system can put that little bit of extra teeth that helps people decide to adhere to things if that makes sense. I think that I know maybe who you're talking about, and I think he has possibly been with them, I think. Sure. So, why don't we just connect after the meeting at some point? My email was on there and I've got it on my phone so it's like I'm accessible. Haley's here like I said in the local community. I'm only over here a couple of days a week. if I'm lucky. Most days, I have

to make the trek too Albany and Blakely so but we're happy to try to see what we can do to provide some support. Chairman Freeman asked you all got any questions on that? Alright, your further down, we had it on the agenda to have a new business. You got a mental health awareness proclamation. Ms. Glass stated Mm hmm. Just proclaiming mental May Mental Health Month for Miller County. Trying to work with all our partners. It happens every May and it's just to try to help raise awareness about mental health and destigmatize because it's just a part of your basic health care. Chairman Freeman asked so we just need to adopt more or less pass this proclamation or for sign it for you. Ms. Glass stated If you so choose to. Chairman Freeman stated alright. You all want to look over? It's on page forty-two. Sounds like something good. Vice Chairman Calhoun asked you want a motion to adopt it? Chairman Freeman stated Yes, this is mental health month of May? Vice Chairman Freeman stated I'll make a motion to adopt. Commissioner Nixon stated I'll second. All in favor. Alright. Motion is carried. Chairman Freeman stated alright. We got that taken care of. did you want us to read this? Ms. Glass stated you don't have to. Chairman Freeman stated okay anything else we need to go over with them. Any questions about anything? Okay. Ms. Glass stated well, if you think of anything, please feel free to reach out and we'll. I will respond and see what we can do to help. Alright. We appreciate it. Thank you.

OLD BUSINESS

Road Ordinance

Chairman Freeman stated alright, the old business was ordinance for the roads. Did you all read over there. Anything you need to add into it you think, or you need to delete a part of it, or did it look like it was fine. I mean we can change it at any point in time. Vice Chairman asked Mr. Cofty did you get this from somebody like another? Mr. Cofty stated it's already been approved by several counties and more. Mr. Cofty stated what I would do is if you approved it, I would just send it over to the lawyer and get his stamp of approval and then it would be implemented. Chairman Freeman stated so it is not a homemade thing. It has been researched a little bit. Chairman Freeman asked the board, you all ok with it as it is? Vice Chairman stated Yeah, send it to somebody else. I mean, I am not a lawyer. It is going to keep folks from digging up the roads. Chairman Freeman stated yes. Vice Chairman Calhoun asked that is what we're trying to do. Chairman Freeman stated yeah, they, if they, you know, disturb the roadway or the right of way, anything like that right there. Put dirt in the road doing any kind of project boring under the road is what it's got in there stuff like that. Vice Chairman Calhoun stated you got to have a permission. You can't say you can't do it. You got to have permission. Chairman Freeman stated yeah. Vice Chairman Calhoun stated you know what I'm saying. Chairman Freeman stated this has a violation down at the bottom where it's got a maximum amount of penalty would be. which was \$1, 000. But I mean it's if we can adopt it. And then if it needs fine tuning attorney says something need changing on it then we can revisit the thing. I say we adopt it and let the lawyer if we need to make any changes. Vice Chairman Calhoun asked do you need a motion? Chairman Freeman stated yes, I need a motion. Vice Chairman made motion to adopt the approval of the road ordinance. Commissioner Nixon seconded it. All in favor. Motion carried.

Intergovernmental Agreement for Drop Yard

Chairman Freeman stated next the intergovernmental agreement with the city for using that. It's called the drop yard. That is what they going to call it. What they going to park the dumpsters that is not being used out there at landfill. Vice Chairman Calhoun asked its just for us to store. Chairman Freeman stated well it's for them to for them to use it.

They going to put up a fence around it. What else are they going to be doing? Mr. Cofty stated they will keep it maintained, keep your grass cut. Commissioner Edwards asked Mr. Cofty stated correct. Chairman Freeman stated they are going to have a fence around. Nobody can get back there. So, somebody won't be going up there dumping in their extra. Commissioner Edwards stated right. They are just sitting in reserve dumpsters. I reckon is what you call it. Chairman Freeman asked other than adopting this, is there anything else we need to do with it? Mr. Cofty stated no, you guys passed it last meeting. Chairman Freeman stated Okay. Mr. Cofty stated we just needed, you know, Cory needed to look at it. He was out. He has looked it over and said look fine for the city. Chairman Freeman asked so we don't need to revisit it. Mr. Cofty stated it just needs approved signing it. Chairman Freeman stated he needed permission to sign it. Vice Chairman Calhoun made a motion to approve signing agreement. Commissioner Nixon seconded, all in favor. Motion carried.

Tennis Court resurfacing

Chairman Freeman stated the tennis court resurfacing. That's on page twenty-two. What did the fellow say about that Doug? Mr. Cofty stated he said He's supposed to be down this week. I think they are waiting on the logos. He sent them off to his image company and he said they're still on track. So, it should be probably this week because he told me two weeks in the May. So, they said it'll be this week, or first of next week. Commissioner Nixon stated so, is it going to be the Rec Department logo? Mr. Cofty stated Yes, the Rec Department logo and it will be four pickleball courts as well inside the tennis courts. Chairman Freeman stated so, there's nothing, that's just information.

911 Equipment Upgrade

Chairman Freeman stated the 911 equipment upgrade. We may be able to get some federal money for some of this. There is no guarantee, but we've been told that it may be possible. So anyway, it is something we're going to have to do but we do not have to do it right now because you got the information in front of you what it says. Mr. Cofty stated Mr. Kreg, if I can jump in here. I got an email late Saturday night from Congressman Bishop's representative in Washington. They are saying that being it's a FEMA Homeland security area. We're going to have to get the state of Georgia to accept the project. Basically, being that they're the recipient of the project and they were just forward it on us. I've got to get with Debbie Henry on that to make sure that they're even willing to do that. If not, we're going to probably be back at it solely on us. Chairman Freeman stated okay we will see where that goes.

Fueling Station Report

Chairman Freeman stated the fueling station report. You all looked over there see any questions on that or Doug do you have any anything you need to. Mr. Cofty stated no, we talked about the database and the server but it's back to running. We've got the City's equipment cards added in so they're going to probably be coming on. I would probably say within a week. Mr. Cofty stated it's been doing pretty good as far as I know, Andy's been using it a lot. Have you had any issues? Mr. Moore stated we haven't had any issues with it at all. So far, it's good. Chairman Freeman asked alright. is the city just going start up or are they going to make a, Mr. Cofty stated they're going to taste the right? They're just going to start up and purchase, but they are purchasing for \$0.10 over what we buy it for.

Spring Creek Resurfacing

Chairman Freeman stated alright. the Spring Creek Park resurfacing. We talked about that. unless he called a date? He emailed me and said that it would be Wednesday before me. He's having like every other prophet. He's having employee problems. So, he only has one, what is it? Survey and crew engines, I believe they call it. So, they're trying to get here. He said he would have an okay. What's he going to do? Is it going to be a breakdown? Because I think we talked about doing part of it one time. And not all at once. We did it. Yeah. They came and looked you know kind of looked at all of it. So. But is he, is he going to break it down in in several parts? We didn't ask him to agree but I can if that's what y'all. Well, dude. You need to. We might be part of it one time and part of it another year and move through it like that. So, you need to break it down. How many parts did would it need to be broke? Um I'd say four. Yeah. Alright. I mean that let him kind of down to it and then three or four. Uh huh. Because you got the parking lot. You know. But he must the biggest part. Yeah. Probably one. Yeah. If he will let him break it down like add several parts. Greg, he and I talked about it when we looked at it. he said if we could kind of hold off to maybe end of the year like October or so right at the end of haven the demand would go down. You know for paving. And that he probably could do a lot better on pricing. You know along in the end but that depends on how fast y'all want to resurface it. But you got to do it right now. But just let him get in here. Yeah. An idea on how we need to go about doing it. So, when that time gets here, we can of. Yeah. Forget. Any more questions on any of that?

NEW BUSINESS

Mental Health Awareness Proclamation

Chairman Freeman stated new business, we did the mental health awareness proclamation. We done took care of that.

Sheriff's Department Lawsuit – Bean

Chairman Freeman states there's another lawsuit pending with this sheriff's department. and you got the information in front of you and then the amount they are seeking is \$250000 dollars. But anyway, we do not have to nothing now. So, anyway, we got the information the legal firm sent us. So, anyway, that's just for information.

Tax Assessors Board Resolution

Chairman Freeman stated alright, the next thing is the board of accessors resolution that's page 46 through 49. The tax assessors board wants to drop the board members down to 3 members. So, if something was to happen, they could conduct business with two members. Did you all want to do, I mean, they need to do that because they, Vice Chairman Calhoun asked all these people have agreed to it right here? Chairman Freeman stated the tax assessor board agreed to it. Vice Chairman Calhoun asked all these people have agreed, right here on page 46. Chairman Freeman stated yes. William Smith, Mike Middleton, and Jujan Bowen. Vice Chairman Calhoun stated two of them already on it. Chairman Freeman states Jujan's got to go to training. Vice Chairman Calhoun stated she's the newest one. Chairman Freeman stated but if something was to happen to one of one of them was absent for medical reasons or whatever, they could still conduct business. They can't have their meetings like they

need to now. Because you're supposed to have a five-minute board and there's three. That's what it takes to do it. You drop it to the three and two can conduct your business. Commissioner Edwards asked that's going to be within the legal guidelines. Chairman Freeman stated yes, but they have not had a meeting because they have not had two members. Cody who's a tax assessor checked with Department of Revenue. So, what they're trying to do, and William Smith is the chairman it's like it needs to be. Vice Chairman Calhoun asked do you need a motion to adopt that then. Chairman Freeman stated yes. Vice Chairman Calhoun stated I'll make a motion to adopt the resolution for the Tax Commission to a three-person board instead of a five-person board. Yes. Commissioner Nixon stated I'll second it. All in favor. Motion carried. Chairman Freeman stated Do I need to read this resolution? I think I need to read. Mr. Cofty stated yes, I would. Chairman Freeman stated alright, Whereas OCGA 48-290 and OCGA 48-5295 provides a county government authority to appoint board for tax assessors consisting of no less than three members and no more than five members for the terms of not less than three years nor more than six years. And whereas in appointing the current five member board of tax assessors, the county government authority inadvertently or to do so by an appropriate resolution that provided for an expiration of the members terms of office and therefore be it resolved by the Miller County Board of Commissioners in a meeting duly assembled that the appointment of the current board of tax such as hereby ratified and confirmed and consist of the appointments for three years as follows member number one William Smith who's chairman member number two is Mike Middleton Senior. Member number three is Jajuan Bowen. The terms run William Smith's 07/01/2020 to 06/30/2023. Mike Middleton 07/01/2021 to 07/1/2024. Member number three is Jajuan Bowen hers started 09/24/2021 to 07/1/2024 would be her expiration date and so it be resolved and do the adopted this day of May 09, 2022. The year is 2012 on here. Mr. Cofty stated he would get Cody to change that. Chairman Freeman stated so, we've already adopted this. That takes care of it.

Dump Truck Purchase

Chairman Freeman stated the next thing, we got there's pictures up here of the dump truck that Andy wanted to purchase. It's a used truck. A new dump truck cost over 100,000 dollars it's 22,500 because you've got 300,000 miles on it. Mr. Moore stated it does. I went and looked at the truck. I drove truck. It shifted out good. The motor runs well. Truck looks good. It doesn't look like them dumps hardly been used. Chairman Freeman asked are you going to leave this flatbed dump on there or are you going to put a, Mr. Moore then stated yes, we can we haul dirt but then we also haul have to haul trees. You know, they won't come out of the dump bed so if we can use that either way. It'd be good if we have it because we lost one and we only have one with a flatbed on it now, but the truck looked like to me a lumber. The guy said a lumber company had it. They run seven trucks. Truck look like to me that it had been well maintained. You know I mean it was sitting on asphalt there wasn't no bunch of oil piled up on the ground. And then again, it's like Kreg said, you know it's high mileage. It's used. But most of them we got were used when we got them, and our problem is we have to stay under 26,000 pounds where we don't have to have CDL drivers. These trucks are just not coming along very often, and we got one of our dump trucks got one foot in the grave now and you may not even make it back out the gate. That's my that's pretty much all I can tell you about it. Just it's been well taken care of. Trucks got real good tires. Vice Chairman Calhoun asked you won't get rid of that truck that you're talking about that's got the foot in the grave. Mr. Moore stated I'm going to run into the motor comes out You know, I mean, we, I don't need to run it as much as we've been to run it because it's getting some more issues that need some attention but there's no need to pour that kind of money and some that the motor's fixing come out of. Motors gone. If you run it hard, it blows out all out of the blow by pipe. And we just kind of babying it and our other truck

has been our backup. Vice Chairman Calhoun asked if you had this one, you wouldn't use it at all, or you would use it. Mr. Moore stated well, you know, we may use it a day or two, you know, alone but we wouldn't be using it like we are now. I mean, I used it all day. We are there on the McClendon Road, put it in that pipe, it hauled dirt all day long. Running from town to McClendon Road and it's getting some other issues that I really like to take it off the road from everyday use. Vice Chairman Calhoun stated I mean, so you would not sell and get rid of it. Mr. Moore stated no, I mean, if you all want to sell it, we will but probably not going to get a lot for it because the motor's gone in it. Vice Chairman Calhoun stated right. Mr. Moore continued, and we've had the motor checked and it can't be rebuilt. You know, you would have to swap motors. You just got to throw another motor in it. One thing that this truck has s wet pistons in. You know, if something must happen, this truck can be rebuilt. It doesn't have a throwaway motor and it's got a Detroit engine in it. Vice Chairman Calhoun stated right. Commissioner Edwards asked is it something, are we going to have someone to thoroughly check it out though before we agree to? Mr. Moore stated I talked to the guys over there in the shop. Vice Chairman Calhoun asked is it Kaufman? Is that where it's at? Mr. Moore stated yes, and they do carry them to the shop. They had another one that they had taken in, but it was on grave digger truck, and it really wasn't something we'd probably interested in. We got some like it already. The trucks just don't come along that often. We've been looking for a long time and you know, the guy sent us, I have happen to see it and then before I could tell him to look at it, he had sent the pictures of it and I, the truck just, it looks like it's been well maintained by who had it. That's all I can say. Chairman Freeman stated other used trucks like this right here that you got. How long have they lasted? Mr. Moore stated we've had the blue dump truck probably 12 years and I run those 700. I got it from the city for a thousand bucks and I run it 10 years I mean. Vice Chairman Calhoun asked how many miles they have on them, 500000. Mr. Moore stated yes something like that. We got a lot of lot of miles on them you know. And the one that's going bad is 15 years old. I got it when I came first came here. And it's been our main truck for 15 years. And it you know it's got a pile of miles and hours on. But it's up to you all. They just don't come along. I wasn't really expecting the truck to pop up. But it did and the truck looks pretty good. I mean, that's all I can say about it. Is it run good, it shifted good. It does have automatic transmission in it. That's some help with us because they can't nobody drive standard shift no more. These guys we're hiring. They can't drive.

Vice Chairman Calhoun asked do they have any kind of warranty like a 30-day warranty or anything. Mr. Moore stated its just as is. It's just rare that one comes along now that is under 26,000 pounds that's used because when we buy them new, we must have them derated when we buy a new and you can't derate it no other time and the truck we just got was derated from the factory. I mean that's the only way we get one now 26,000 and under. Mr. Cofty stated he has plenty of SPLOST and T- SPLOST, it can be made that purchase. Mr. Moore stated I don't want to make decision by myself. You all look at the pictures. I mean, I hadn't been around the truck. All I can say is it look good, drove good. Front end didn't seem to be wore out. You know, I kind of checked some of that and it looked very well maintained. Chairman Freeman stated you all want to let him get the truck. Vice Chairman Calhoun stated I am okay with it I mean I think 300,000 isn't pile of miles on a diesel Detroit like that. I mean it's a lot of miles. Mr. Moore stated we run motors like that in the semis and the first 3 or 4 months we usually have that many miles. Vice Chairman Calhoun stated 300 is a baby. You know with a Detroit or Caterpillar motor or something like that. Chairman Freeman stated alright you want to make a motion to let him get the truck. Vice Chairman Calhoun made motion to let Andy get the truck. Commissioner Nixon seconded the motion, all in favor, Motion carried.

Chairman Freeman asked is there anything else we need to go over. That's the last thing because then the department heads, do you have anything you need to go over, other than the truck, Andy? Mr. Moore stated no, I think the road, you know we've been ditching some on both sides of the county and I think that little rain here pulled them roads together over there on your side and we put in a piece of pipe over there on the McLendon road and we get this pipe in we are having to build a road up about 3 or 4 foot and it's going to take us a day or two when we get through with that. We going to work some of these sections that's dry enough, we're going to start ditching them and then we'll catch the wetter sections because there are some wet spots and dry spots. that need some attention. We are working on Daniels Road, ditching it now. I mean, the roads are kind of hard. It hadn't been raining. We've been swapped over to trying to ditch but it got a little dry on us at the end, but it rained a little bit. We back at it today. Commissioner Edwards stated I think you did a great job on Griffin Sheffield the other day. Good job. I'm not getting any phone calls. So, you did a real good job. Mr. Moore stated we going to have to work on it a little bit like we'll have to do McClendon. We'll have to go back, and we did those big ditches and build a road up 4 feet. You will have to go back widen it. We went back, widen that one some and that road's coming in well. We do have a couple more spots. We going to have to address a little later, Ladon and I'll talk about one, but we can't get to it right now. We are working on something. We already got material for so, we are going to us continue when we run out of that. We'll start addressing some of the other spots and that's about all I got. Chairman Freeman stated the only other thing that was a letter came here and it's from ACCG is there was a refund on the workman's comp insurance program. We are supposed to be getting some money back, a refund of \$17,362.00. Vice Chairman Calhoun stated that will help pay for the truck right now. Mr. Moore stated about the amount of money for them next pipe we got to buy. Chairman Freeman stated alright if there is nothing else, we need a motion to adjourn. Commissioner Nixon made motion to adjourn, Vice Chairman Calhoun seconded the motion. All in favor. Motion carried
